# Survey Results on AI Use

Teachers in 17 different countries responded to a number of scenarios in which ChatGPT could be used for learning purposes and then rated the level of appropriateness of using this AI from Strongly Agree (very appropriate) to Strongly Disagree.



# Summary of Survey Comments

- "I think my approval of many of these scenarios would depend on the specific instructions students were given."
- "I haven't used Chat GPT so much but the former cases have given me a wider view of all the different ways to use and apply them. I would give it a try again."
- "Al is quite useful if used appropriately, but it shouldn't be the only source of knowledge replacing human reflection and personal effort."

# Survey Summary

 "I responded neutrally to all questions because rushing into a new trend is just not my personality. I am an advocate of this new technology as a learning tool when used "correctly' with boundaries in place. The questions in this survey are the backbone of a ChatGPT policy in education."

# **Creating Effective Prompts**

- 1. Be clear and specific.
- 2. Provide context and examples.
- 3. Specify the format.
- 4. Include constraints (e.g., word count).
- 5. Try different iterations to achieve refined results.



# Expanding Vocabulary

Tomoko is writing a descriptive paragraph on her favorite restaurant and is looking for common adjectives to describe the different senses. She tells ChatGPT to give her three descriptive adjectives for each sense, along with a definition, and sample sentence. Now that she understands these words better, she writes her paragraph using the ideas as models, but she does not copy the sentences.



# **Brainstorming Research Topics**


James is writing a comparison and contrast essay on face-to-face learning versus remote learning. He asks ChatGPT to come up with five ideas to compare and contrast the two topics. He then brings these ideas to class, discusses the strengths of each in a small group, and gets feedback from the group. He then selects the three strongest points of each based on this discussion and writes his essay on his own.




# **Brainstorming Research Topics**

A student asks ChatGPT to generate 10 alternative thesis statements for their argumentative essay so they can explore different angles and perspectives. The student selects the best one that meets the essential criteria describe by the teacher and represents their own views, and adds the thesis statement to their paper, perhaps with slight modifications.

33 responses




A student asks ChatGPT to generate three drafts of a paragraph, compares the three versions, and develops their own final version by integrating and refining the best ideas from all of them. <sup>33 responses</sup>




- 1 Rated very appropriate use of AI by teachers
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Samantha, a high school student, is struggling with understanding Shakespearean language in "Macbeth." She uses ChatGPT to generate modern translations of difficult passages to aid her comprehension before performing a scene from the play in class.




# Generating Debate Rebuttals

Olivia, a high school student, is preparing for a class debate on climate change. Prior to the debate, she asks ChatGPT to generate a list of potential counterarguments from her opponent so she can create effective rebuttals. She looks over the results to enhance her preparedness for her opponent's challenging discussion and arguments.



Mia, a middle school student, is learning Spanish in her language class. She engages ChatGPT in conversational practice sessions to improve. Maria asks ChatGPT to give her a question in Spanish in text format, she writes her response, and then ChatGPT corrects her Spanish. Then, ChatGPT gives her another question.



# Survey Summary

- Some of these ideas are absolutely great ways to highlight how ChatGPT could be useful.
- I think it's crucial that we allow or even encourage our students to use AI/ ChatGPT, but there should be regulations, limits, and methods as to how they can do that.
- As long as students are using the tool as an aide in learning, citing where needed this will serve as a learning enhancer. As teachers, we should be teaching them and facilitating how to use Gen AI for their benefit.

Clear and concise prompts reduce the need for followup questions and clarifications, saving time for both the user and the AI.
